YOUR HAIR LOSS DUE TO CHEMOTHERAPY MAY HELP SOMEONE ELSE IN NEED.

Discuss with your doctor or other health care professional whether you are likely to lose your hair as a result of your chemotherapy. If so, you may be able to donate your hair to an organization that provides a wig or hair replacement system to someone who has lost hair as a result of chemotherapy, radiation treatments, alopecia, burns, or other medical circumstances.

The anticipated trauma of hair loss is considered one of the negative aspects of many types of chemotherapy. The change in appearance can drastically undermine one's self-image and sabotage self-esteem, which is, of course, not helpful in the healing process. By donating your hair, you will be turning a negative aspect of your cancer treatment into a positive outcome... for yourself and for someone else: a child or a woman in need of assistance. Feeling good by helping someone else is the ultimate win-win situation for anyone, and is one way to counter the passive, out-of-control feeling of being treated for cancer.

The hair systems provided by Locks of Love, Wigs for Kids, and Beautiful Lengths are made to look just like one's own hair so that recipients can undertake usual activities and feel better about themselves. It takes many bunches of hair to make a wig, and your bunch will be in good company

Whether or not you can donate your hair, consider cutting your hair short in anticipation of your hair loss from chemotherapy. Many people find that they feel more in control by determining when and where they will lose their hair.

REFLECTIONS ON THE GAINS FROM MY HAIR LOSS By Leslie S. Ries, Breast Cancer Survivor and Founder of The Fuchsia Foundation

One of the things that caused me great stress after I learned of my breast cancer diagnosis and had my surgery was the impending loss of my hair from chemotherapy. My red hair reflected my individuality, and at first the loss of my hair symbolized the loss of control of my body and my vulnerability.

I agonized over whether to cut my hair or wait for it to fall out on its own. A few days before my first chemo treatment, it dawned on me that there was an outside shot that I could donate my hair. I looked at the websites for Locks of Love and Wigs for Kids (Beautiful Lengths did not exist then) and saw the minimum requirement for hair donation was 10 inches of hair. Sitting at my desk, I got a ruler out and saw that my hair was 10 inches long in many places. I was ecstatic to be able to envision my hair being used for a child with cancer, alopecia or other long-term hair loss. My attitude instantly turned from dread of losing my hair to happiness that it would be used for a child who needed it.

My two daughters came with me to my hair salon, and we were joined by my husband and two of my best girlfriends (one of whom had just completed chemotherapy herself). Off it came, in snippets cut as close to the scalp as possible. I had tears with the first cut and then I was fine, totally relieved to have this moment of dread behind me and at peace with the loss of the hair. We made a nice ponytail and it was ready to be mailed. My daughter Carly photographed the transformation from my old look to my new one (with a rather cute cropped cut), including a group photo of my support team.

When I think of all of the hair that is swept up and thrown away with tears from the people losing it, I know that many of those people would be so happy, as I was, to visualize that hair going to a child or a woman without hair. I could not find any organized program to encourage donation of hair by chemotherapy patients and so I decided to start my own. My husband and I formed a non-profit organization called The Fuchsia Foundation to develop innovative projects and products that help people undergoing treatment for cancer and their loved ones. The first large scale project of the foundation is the production and distribution of this brochure. By increasing hair donations, we are helping those who donate their hair as well as those who receive the hair. In doing so, we are offering a tremendous option to many women and children with cancer who agonize over the loss of their hair. It is truly a "win-win" situation that prevents the needless sweeping away of hair that can be used to help others. Everyone can help someone else, and feel good in doing so.

HOW CAN I HELP?

You can donate your hair to help Wigs for Kids or Locks of Love provide hair replacement systems for children or Beautiful Lengths to make wigs for women who have lost their hair due to cancer treatments.

WHAT ARE THE REQUIREMENTS FOR HAIR DONATION?

Note: Each organization has its own requirements for hair donations. Contact the organization of your choice to verify its criteria before mailing in hair.

- 1. Hair must be clean and dry. Hair that has been cut and saved is suitable for donation.
- Minimum length for a hair donation is 8-12 inches; each organization has different specifications. Check with an organization before sending your hair to them.
- 3. If you are going to lose your hair to chemotherapy, many people have found that the best way to take control of the process, rather than to wait for it to fall out when and where it chooses, is to have a short haircut just prior to or just after beginning chemotherapy. This is also the best way to preserve hair for donation. If you have very long hair that makes a ponytail of 8-12 inches, you can merely pull your hair into a ponytail and have it cut at that point. However, you may find that you have the minimum length of 8-12 inches of hair (or even more) if you cut your hair in sections, close to the scalp.

You can get a great cropped style, preserve your hair for donation, and take control of the hair loss process—all in one step.

- 4. Hair may be cut at your local salon. Donations should be braided or tied in ponytails and secured with rubber bands or elastics, wrapped in tissue paper, and then sealed in a mailing envelope.
- Hair donations should be mailed to one of the following, which should be contacted prior to mailing for more details regarding its bair donation program:

Furthermore, none of its employees or members of the Board of Directors is associated with any company in the hair replacement or hair care industries.

Beautiful Lengths is a partnership of Pantene®, HAIRUWEAR®, and two non-profit organizations: Women's Cancer Research Fund and Entertainment Industry Foundation. Beautiful Lengths provides wigs made of donated bair to women who have lost their hair due to cancer treatment.

The Fuchsia Foundation, which produced this brochure, offers products and programs to support people undergoing treatment for breast cancer and their loved ones. We provide greeting cards for people to send to thank those who have been supportive during treatment, thereby promoting communication with important contacts and boosting self-esteem. We also make grants to other non-profit organizations for projects that do not duplicate services already offered by other cancer support organizations. For example, a recent grant provided financial assistance for the purchase of prescription drugs for people undergoing treatment who were without adequate insurance coverage or with no coverage and could not afford drugs that would make their treatment less difficult to experience.
